Would you like to go to the Holy Land in early 2021? Talk to me. Pastor John

Daniel 11:2-35 Notes

Daniel was grieved for his people and he prayed. God honored his prayer with one long, last vision. These verses are the second treatment of, and the most voluminous part, of the vision.

The prophecy is a message of encouragement but not a message of "everything is going to be nice and easy." It was a message that Israel was going to be in the middle of a long, long, terrible period of war and they were going to need to have sustained faith and courage. THAT's the kind of faith building encouragement God gave here in ch. 11.

I. Encouragement to be Faithful in Your Time (Daniel 11:2-35)

The angel told Daniel what was going to happen to the Jews after 535 BC (Daniel's current year). Daniel 10:14, "*Now I have come to explain to you <u>what will happen to your people in the future</u>, for the vision concerns <u>a time yet to come</u>." Daniel 10:1, "...it concerned a great war."*

Verse 2 began where Daniel was and sped him through the rest of the dominant years of the Persian Empire. I say "dominant years" because after the 4 kings mentioned (Ahasuerus – Ezra 4:6, Artaxerxes – Ezra 4:7-23, Darius – Ezra 4:24, and Xerxes – Esther) there were other Persian kings, but they were subjected to the power of the Greek Empire. Verses 3-4 speak of the rise and fall of Alexander the Great and the 4 generals who would break up his conquered territories to rule as separate kingdoms (Lysimachus, Cassander, Ptolemy, and Seleucus Nicator). To get a sense of the pace of chapter 11, we need to understand that verses 2-5 cover a period of 212 years (535-323 BC).

Daniel 11:5-20 deals with the time frame of 323-175 BC—the next 148 years. There verses document part of the extended war between the Seleucans (Syria) and Ptolemies (Egypt). If we looked at a map it would become clear why this mattered to Daniel and the unfolding of God's redemptive plan. Israel was "no man's land" in this war. It was tred upon during every offensive, and retreat, in either direction. They suffered greatly for generations.

Daniel 11 is one of the most difficult chapters in the Bible. It is prophecy that, in the case of verses 2-35, has become history. Married to a good history book, we can make the following connections:

- 11:5 "*king of the South*" = Ptolemy Soter; "*one of his commanders*" = Seleucus Nicator
- 11:6 "*The daughter of the king of the South*" = Berenice and Ptolemy Philadelphia; "*king of the North*" = Antiochus Theos
- 11:7-9 "One from her family line" = Ptolemy Euergetes; "king of the North" = Seleucus Callinicus
- 11:10 *"His sons"* = Seleucus Ceraunus and Antiochus the Great
- 11:11-16 "*the king of the South*" = Ptolemy Philopater; "*king of the North*" = Antiochus the Great
- 11:17 "*he*" = Antiochus the Great; "*king of the south*" = (boy king) Ptolemy Epiphanes; "*a daughter*" = Cleopatra
- 11:18-19 "*he*" = Antiochus the Great; "*a commander*" = Roman commander Lucius Cornelius Scipio
- 11:20 "*His successor*" = Seleucus Philopater; "*a tax collector*" = Heliodorus

Daniel chapter 11 would be best studied in a college course on ancient history and a seminary course in prophecy. Only by taking THAT kind of time and focusing THAT closely to the details could we see just how beautifully and intricately the Bible predicted all of those events. I hope that by connecting the above names with their companion verses you might be able to study, on your own, about the events that were prophecied and were fulfilled.

Remember, the focus of this divine message was Israel. Consider the vicious rub on their lives and land during every invasion. The soldiers of both armies lived off the land and abused the inhabitants and their homes. Jewish leaders would make deals with one king or the other to improve their situations. Retribution always came by the other side. Even the kings that made promises, to compromised Jews, never kept them. These terrible days saw many generations come and go and each one had the opportunity to be faithful in his or her time.

II. Encouragement to be Faithful to the Truth

(Daniel 10:1,21; 11:2)

There is an old argument about the book of Daniel. Unbelieving critics have written many books disputing the possibility of Daniel being written during the time of the Babylonian and Persian Empires. They deny the authenticity of the book for one simple reason. <u>It's too accurate.</u>

Chapter 11:2-35 has 135 detailed predictions spanning 371 years. The accuracy is flawless. The scope is mind-blowing. The unbeliever has no other choice but to reject it saying, "There's just no way!"

But there is a way—a way the unbeliever will not consider. God is the way. The actual existence of God who revealed Himself and many of His mysteries in a Holy Book is what happened here. It's another supernatural occurrence in the book of Daniel. God told an angel what would happen. The angel told Daniel. Daniel wrote it down.

The inspired text indicates that God knew this would be disbelieved. When this last vision is introduced in 10:1 we read, "*Its message was <u>true</u>...*" 10:21 calls the source of this information "*the*

Book of <u>Truth</u>." The angel reaffirms God's point again in 11:2, "Now then, I tell you the <u>truth</u>..."

Believer, can you trust the book of Daniel? If you can trust Jesus, you can. Jesus quoted Daniel in Matthew 24:15. In His quote He affirmed His belief in the book of Daniel and the person of Daniel who Jesus called, "*the prophet*."

Think about the original recipients of this prophecy. In terrible times, they had to trust a scroll that was written hundreds of years before by a man who claimed to have received the message from an angel sent by God. How is that different from the faith God is asking of us today?

III. Encouragement to be Faithful through the Trials

(Daniel 11:21-35)

Daniel 11:21-35 is about one last Seleucan (Syrian) king. He is introduced in Daniel 7:8 as the "*little horn*" and in Daniel 8:25 as the "*prince of princes*." He is AN antichrist (not THE antichrist). Here he is called "*a contemptible person*" (11:21).

These verses track his ascendancy, his activities, and his atrocities. You can read all about Antiochus IV Epiphanes in any history article on the times. Here, the focus is Israel. The problem is apostacy. And, the story goes like this.

Antiochus Epiphanes had invaded Egypt with great success (11:25-28). He came just short of conquering all the fortified cities in Egypt and winning the war once and for all. In the end, he had to sit at the table and make a truce with Ptolemy Philometor (11:27). It was a truce that neither of them kept, but resulted in Antiochus Epiphanes acquiring a lot of wealth at Egypt's expense.

When he invaded again, it turned out differently (11:29). He encountered a new obstacle—"*Ships of the western coastlands*..." (11:30). These ships were the Romans and their power was on the rise. A legate from the Roman Senate, Popilius Laenas, gave Antiochus Epiphanes an ultimatum. He drew a circle around the deceiving, horrible king and told him, "Before you step out of that circle, you give me your answer in conformance with the senate's demands." (John Philips, *Exploring Daniel*. Page 186)

Antiochus Epiphanes had lost. He knew it. This was a TREMENDOUS HUMILIATION. A man with a demonic spirit could not countenance such an embarrassment. Verse 30, "*Then he will turn back and VENT HIS FURY against the holy covenant. He will return and show* <u>favor</u> to those who forsake the holy covenant."

Antiochus Epiphanes left Egypt, went straight to Judah, and slaughtered 10's of thousands of Jews. He sold 10's of thousands more into slavery. His army was savage. The evil spirit of antichrist inside him hated God and hated the people who God loved. He focused his rage on the faithful ones. He forbid circumcision. He brought a sudden halt to the sacrifices. He "*set up the abomination that causes desolation*" (31) when he sacrificed a pig on an altar to Zeus in the holy of holies. Furthermore, he banned the Holy Scriptures. Copies were burned. Anyone caught with them was executed. Everything beautiful in God's sight was defiled or destroyed. Every obedience to God was severely punished. And, there was "*flattery*" intended to "*corrupt those who violated the covenant*" (32). There was "*favor to those who forsake the holy covenant*" (29).

Apostacy is abandoning and renouncing the faith. The days of Antiochus Epiphanes was a day of tremendous apostacy by the Jews. They considered their lives more precious than their faith. They took the pragmatic road. Being true to their covenant with God meant trouble. So, they did whatever Antiochus Epiphanes demanded including renouncing YaHWeH, worshiping idols, and eventually worshiping Antiochus Epiphanes himself!

"BUT THE PEOPLE WHO KNOW THEIR GOD WILL FIRMLY RESIST HIM" (32). Praise God for people who *"did not love their lives so much as to shrink from death"* (Revelation 12:11). Even under the horrific trials of Antiochus Epiphanes, an antichrist, God had His faithful.

Daniel 11:2-35 is prophecy that became history. It's a challenging study. We do not need to be so immature as to shrink away from it because the message is tremendously important. God is asking His people to be faithful to Him in their own time, with the Truth of His Word, and in the face of terrible trials.



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
