Daniel 10

Notes

Daniel chapters 10-12 are one long, last vision. Let's look at how it begins—One Long, Last Vision (Part One).

I. Why so Sad? (Daniel 10:1-3)

Daniel is an emotional mess in this chapter, and he has reasons to be. "In the third year of Cyrus King of Persia," (10:1) Daniel might be as old as 88 years. Daniel 1:21 tells us that he remained in the kings' service "until the first year of King Cyrus." So, he's 2-3 years into his retirement from government work. What's he doing?

In 2 Chronicles 36:22-23 (and Ezra 1:1-4), King Cyrus, himself, tells us that God has caused him to get the temple in Jerusalem rebuilt. In his first year, he made a decree that any and all of the Israelites could go home and begin rebuilding.

Daniel was in Babylon for over 70 years. He was the chief intercessor and spiritual leader for his people (and the kings who ruled over them). When it was finally time to go home, he was left behind. No doubt, God led him to stay. But that didn't make it any easier. Why was it God's will for him to remain in Babylon?

Over 40,000 brave and faithful Israelites left to endure the hardship of beginning again in Judah. They had a pioneer/missionary spirit for sure. It was going to be tough! More than two times that many Israelites were unwilling to go back. They had become <u>comfortable in their captivity</u>. They were making money. They had assimilated into the culture. Cyrus said they could <u>all</u> go back and rebuild the place

God ordained to make Himself known in the world, and they said, "Nah. We're good."

Daniel has a lot of reasons to be hurting. He stood at the place of departure and hugged his beloved countrymen for the last time. His closest friends and family were dead or departed. When he looked around to see who and what was left, all he saw was loss and compromise.

Daniel fasted from luxuries and choice foods for 21 days. His fast ended on "the 24th day of the first month" (10:2-3). That means that his fast was connected to the Feasts of Passover and Unleavened Bread. Think about that.

Passover was a celebration of another time in Israel's history when they were captive in a foreign land. At that time God compelled a pagan king to let His people go. Daniel saw God do it again with Cyrus two years before his fast! At the time of the Exodus from Egypt, no one stayed behind. Three million Israelites and many Egyptians, Libyans, Cushites, Midianites, and maybe even some Phoenicians and Philistines joined them (Gen. 12:38). They saw the finger of God in the plagues and the Passover. They saw that He spared everyone who obeyed His Word and covered their homes with the blood of the lamb. They decided to follow YaHWeH wherever He would lead. Wouldn't you have? Have you? I have. My family has joined the exodus and wherever He leads, we'll go.

In Babylon, most of the people didn't go. Daniel fasted and prayed for 21 days. In response to his prayers, God gave him one long, last vision.

II. Who You Have to See (Daniel 10:4-13)

There's a lot in this world we cannot see. We can't see the power of a word spoken to a heart and its impact to define, destroy, or save. We can't see the COVID-19 virus even though it's turning the world upside down. The most powerful things in the universe are things we currently cannot see with our human eyes.

Daniel sees someone in 10:4-9. Who is it? He's wearing a white, linen robe. He has a golden belt or sash. His eyes were like "blazing fire" or "flaming torches." His arms and legs gleamed like "burnished bronze." His voice was like "a multitude" or "the sound of rushing waters" (if you make this sound with your mouth you can hear how they sound alike). All of these descriptions are found here in Daniel 10 and Revelation 1:13-18. They are describing the same being and, in Revelation 1, the one described says, "Do not be afraid. I am the First and the Last. I am the Living One; I was dead, and now look, I am alive for ever and ever! And I hold the keys of death and Hades." Daniel saw Jesus.

Daniel saw Jesus while he was standing on the bank of the Tigris river. Genesis 2 tells us that the Tigris is one of the 4 rivers that flowed out of Eden. Eden is where God walked and talked with a man and a woman.

Daniel's companions couldn't see Jesus but they were terrified by what they sensed and they ran and hid. Saul of Tarsus was blinded by Jesus on the road to Damascus. His companions couldn't see Jesus either (Acts 9:4-7).

When Ezekiel saw the Lord, he "fell face down" (Ezekiel 1:28). Paul "fell to the ground" when he saw Him too. John fell down "as though dead." Daniel said he "fell into a deep sleep, my face to the ground" (10:9). Psalm 130:3 says, "If you O Lord kept a record of wrongs, who could stand?" Daniel was a good and godly man of obedience and prayer. He couldn't stand. No "good man" is going to stand in Christ's presence and there is no good standing before God outside of Christ's forgiveness. God does keep a record of wrongs but Psalm 130:4 says, "But with you there is forgiveness..."

We have to see Jesus. We also need to know about something else we can't see (Daniel 10:12-13,20). There are battles being waged by unseen combatants in the heavenly realms. The messenger angel, who woke Daniel up, was "resisted" by the "prince of the Persian kingdom" for 21 days (10:10-13). He needed some help to break

through and bring his message to Daniel. Help came. Michael, "one of the chief princes" (see Daniel 12:1 and Rev. 12:7 for more about Michael) got him through. In verse 20 the angel makes another statement about returning to "fight against the prince of Persia" and the imminent arrival of the "prince of Greece."

The devil is the "prince of this world" (John 12:31; 14:30; 16:11; and Eph. 2:2) and he has his "princes" positioned in territories around the world. These fallen angelic beings are tough and we are warned not to meddle with them. The Bible makes it clear that we are not to practice sorcery, witchcraft, divining, or anything along those lines. These beings are much more powerful than we are. But then, there is prayer. When we pray in the name of Jesus, God deals with these beings. Jesus sent 1000 of them fleeing into a herd of pigs (Mark 5:1-20) and at the sound of His name they tremble (James 2:19). When we pray we are affecting the battle among the angels. Remember, "Our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms" (Eph. 6:12).

III. What You Have to Know (Daniel 10:15-18,21)

It's all been written. Daniel chapter 11 is the prophecy/history of the events that took place from Daniel's time until the end of time. Most of it has already happened now. Some of it is still to come. One thing is certain though, it's all been settled. The messenger angel came to give the aged Daniel one last message. He came to tell him what was "written in the Book of Truth" (10:21).

Daniel had fear and sadness. The powerful vision of Jesus just about did him in. Because of what's been written in heaven and because of Who wrote it, AND because God considers him "highly esteemed" he can now know "Peace!" and "Be strong now; be strong," (10:19).
